Spiritual Notes:

Mark's contrast between the ostentatiousness of the scribes and the generosity of the "poor widow" challenges us to examine the motivation for our religious practices. The outward signs of religious devotion are associated with piety; many people confuse piety and sanctity. The scribes who "go around in long robes" and "recite lengthy prayers," appear on the outside to be holy. But "they devour the houses of widows" and so "will receive a very severe condemnation" Jesus says. What is in our hearts counts more than our outward practice of religion. Jesus points out that the poor widow "has contributed all she had." The widow of Zarephath who encounters the prophet Elijah stands as another example of someone who is generous even though she is poor. Despite the fact that her resources are nearly depleted, she provides food for the prophet. Her kindness is rewarded as, for the duration of a drought, "the jar of flour did not go empty, nor the jug of oil run dry." She cannot afford to be pious, but she is rich in holiness, as indicated by her generosity and trust. And for her kindness, God rewards her. As a gentile she serves as an example to the Jews of what it means to be an instrument of God's grace. The writer of Hebrews compares Jesus with the high priest of Jerusalem. As the high priest enters the sanctuary Jerusalem Temple to offer sacrifice on behalf of people, Christ entered "heaven itself, that he might now appear before God on our behalf." Unlike the sacrifice of the high priest, which is offered "each year," Christ's sacrifice is offered once to take away the sins of many, ("many" being a Semitism meaning for "all"). When He appears a second time, He will bring salvation to those who eagerly await Him.

For reflection: Do my acts of piety reflect an inner desire for holiness? Do I share from my surplus or from my "livelihood?"

Notas Espirituales:

Comparar de Marcos entre la ostentación de los escribas y de la generosidad de la "viuda pobre" nos desafía a examinar la motivación de nuestras prácticas religiosas. Los signos externos de devoción religiosa se asocian a la piedad; muchas personas confunden la piedad con la santidad. Los escribas, que "van por ahí con ropas largas" y "recitan largas oraciones," aparecen en el exterior para ser santo. Pero "devoran las casas de las viudas," y así "recibirán una condena muy severa," dice Jesús. Lo que está en nuestros corazones cuenta más que nuestra práctica externa de la religión. Jesús señala que la viuda pobre "ha contribuido con todo lo que tenía." La viuda de Sarepta que se encuentra con el profeta Elías se presenta como otro ejemplo de alguien que es generoso a pesar de que es pobre. A pesar de que sus recursos están casi agotados, que proporciona alimentos para el profeta, Su bondad es recompensada como por la duración de una sequía, "el tarro de harina no iba vacío, ni la jarra de aceite corría seca ." Ella no puede permitirse el lujo de ser piadosa, pero ella es rica en santidad, tal como lo indica la confianza. Y por su bondad, Dios la premia. Como un gentil que sirve como ejemplo para los Judíos de lo que significa ser un instrumento de la gracia de Dios. El escritor de Hebreos compara a Jesús con el sumo sacerdote de Jerusalén. Como entra el sumo sacerdote en el santuario del templo de Jerusalén para ofrecer sacrificios en nombre del pueblo, Cristo entró "al propio cielo, que él podría comparecer ante Dios en favor nuestro." A diferencia del sacrificio del sumo sacerdote, que se ofrece "cada año," El sacrificio de Cristo es "ofrecido una sola vez para quitar los pecados de muchos" ("muchos" siendo un antisemitismo que significa "todos"). Cuando aparezca un "segundo tiempo," traerá la "salvación a los que ansiosamente le esperan."

Para reflexionar: ¿Mis actos de piedad reflejan un deseo interno de la santidad? ¿Comparto de lo que me sobra o de mi "medio de vida?"
