Celebration of the Epiphany - Tres Magos

On Sunday, January 3, 2016, the Church celebrates the Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord, otherwise known as the discovery of the child by the "Three Magi." Their procession of kings, animals, shepherds to the crib to recall earlier practices of the Anglo/European Church has since been abandoned. These practices live on as an integral part of the Liturgy of the Three Kings in the Hispanic culture. Mass will be celebrated at 1:30 p.m. with the procession beginning at 1:00 p.m. A dinner will follow in the Parish Hall. Everyone in the parish is invited to attend both Mass and dinner. Spiritual Notes:

Today's feast was established in 1921; in 1969 it was given a three year cycle of readings. In today's reading from the first Book of Samuel we meet Hannah and her husband Elkanah, one of the many couples in the Old Testament who are childless until God intervenes. In the Old Testament world, childlessness was viewed as a punishment from God. After the Lord hears Hannah's prayer, which she offered at the temple, she conceives and gives birth to a son, who she names Samuel, a play on the Hebrew verb "to ask," because she had asked the Lord for him. Once the child was weaned, Hannah presented him at the temple at Shiloh and dedicated him for the service to the Lord. In her gratitude, she offers to the Lord, the child she had received from him. In John we are reminded that in Christ we experience God's love which allows us to be called the children of God. And yet, there is more to come, for God's plan for us is that we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is. As children of God we are called to keep his commandments and do what pleases him. Luke is the only canonical Gospel to tell us anything about Jesus' childhood. The story of the boy's visit to Jerusalem when he is 12 years old paints a picture of Jesus growing into a young man and an observant Jew. Passover was a pilgrimage feast, and families would often travel together on the multiple day journey. The journey from Galilee to Jerusalem would take several days by foot. Staying behind to engage in a dialogue with the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions is a sign of Jesus' knowledge and love of the Law, which is what was studied and debated in the temple precincts. For our Gospel, this is Jesus' first step from a child of Bethlehem to a man of Galilee, who would embrace as part of God's family all who accept his message.

For reflection: What is my response when God answers my prayers? Do I show gratitude as Hanna did? Luke tells us that Jesus "advanced in wisdom"; do I seek to grow in my understanding of faith?

The Jubilee Year of Mercy
December 8, 2015 - November 20, 2016

The second corporal work of mercy - to give drink to the thirsty. God always does what he asks us to do. Wandering in the wilderness, the Israelites could not find water and bitterly complained to Moses of their thirst. God told Moses, "I will be standing there in front of you on the rock of Horeb. Strike the rock, and the water will flow from it for the people to drink" (Ex 17:6) Wine was a very important part of a Jewish wedding feast. To run out of wine was a grievous embarrassment for the wedding couple. Knowing this, Jesus acted with compassion and miraculously provided additional wine for the wedding party at Cana. Using his physical thirst to open a dialogue with the Samaritan woman, Jesus bestowed on the woman and her fellow townspeople the blessing of spiritual water. He said to the Samaritan woman, who came to the well to draw water, "Give me a drink" (Jn 4:7). Thirst and giving a drink to alleviate the thirst can result in a grace filled encounter. To answer Jesus' "I am thirsty" from the cross (Jn 19:28), we may provide drink to young children who are ill, and the frail who may not be able to do it for themselves; give bottle water to the homeless, or assist the needy in paying their water bills.

Once again, I have been given the opportunity to serve the people of Ecuador this spring on a medical and catechetical mission trip. Through Missions of Peace of Franciscan University, we will be able to care for the native Ecuadorians both physically and spiritually by ministering to those who lack both proper medical treatment and consistent access to a priest and the Sacraments. I was overwhelmed with the support and generosity I received from this parish last year when I asked for your help, and I am very thankful for it! I am asking for your support once more. Without the help of people like you, this mission is not possible. I ask you to please consider donating as well as keeping us in your prayers. Thank you in advance for your support and generosity.

Notas Espirituales:

En muchas parroquias, el día de Navidad no es tan ocupado como la víspera de Navidad; En la misa de Navidad por la mañana es una celebración tranquila. Pero la lectura asignada a las dos misas el día de Navidad, una "en el amanecer" y la otra "durante el día," nos presentan diversas dimensiones de una fiesta que no puede ser celebrada por un día, pero más bien en una octava y como su propia temporada. El profeta Isaías, escribe a un pueblo en el exilio que están a punto de regresar a Jerusalén, declara: "Qué hermoso esta sobre los montes los pies del que trae buenas nuevas, ... anunciando la salvación ." El profeta anuncia que" el Señor (esta) restaurando a Sión "; el Señor consuela a su pueblo, rescata a Jerusalén." El mensaje de Isaías de esperanza a los exiliados en Babilonia adquiere un significado más pleno en la encarnación, como Jesús es el mensaje final de Dios de la esperanza, trayendo salvación para todas las personas. El autor de la Carta a los Hebreos nos dice que antes, "Dios habló de muchos modos a nuestros antepasados. Pero ahora, en Cristo Jesús, Dios "nos ha hablado por medio del Hijo, ... por quien creó el universo." Jesús es la revelación final de Dios - no sólo de palabra, sino también en la carne. Esto se refleja en el himno de encarnación de Juan que es el evangelio de hoy. Juan comienza su Evangelio con lo que originalmente era un himno. Haciéndose eco del comienzo del Génesis, en el primer libro de la Biblia, escribió "En el principio era el Verbo, y el Verbo era con Dios, y el Verbo era Dios." Esto desarrolla la idea de la Sabiduría en el Antiguo Testamento, que fue personificado como estar presente con Dios delante de todo lo demás. Juan continúa diciendo que "todas las cosas llegaron a ser a través de (la Palabra)"; esta Palabra "se hizo carne y habitó entre nosotros." Jesús es la presencia de Dios en medio de nosotros. Esta presencia es la fuente de nuestra alegría al celebrar el nacimiento de nuestro Salvador.

Para reflexionar: ¿Encuentro *Alegría en el mensaje de la Navidad?* ¿Qué tipo de *liberación necesito de Dios en esta Navidad?*
