## Spiritual Notes:

The first and second books of Kings tell the story of the kings of Israel and Judah. Israel, the northern kingdom, broke away from the nation after the death of Solomon. In the days of Elijah the prophet, Israel was ruled by King Ahab and his wife, Queen Jezebel. Together, they sought to eliminate worship of Yahweh from their nation. In the text leading up to our reading, the Lord had commanded Elijah to anoint a new King, Jehu, son Nimshi in anticipation of Ahab's death. Elijah is also to anoint his successor, Elisha as the next prophet in Israel. In today's reading, Elisha cuts his ties with the past by destroying his plowing equipment and slaughtering his oxen for a final feast with his people. He is ready to engage in his mission, there is no turning back. In Galatia, Paul battled with a rival gospel that taught obedience to the Law of Moses. He wrote to remind the Galatians that because of Baptism, you are not under the law; rather you are called for freedom. But freedom requires responsibility for without control, freedom can lead us back to the yoke of slavery. Rather, serve one another through love. Jesus's journey to Jerusalem begins with today's Gospel, a new episode in His life. The focus from this point on is what Jerusalem means. In Luke's text, Jerusalem is the city of persecution and death. Beginning his journey south, Jesus must pass through Samaritan territory, but they would not welcome Him, because the destination of his journey was Jerusalem. The disciples are upset by this and want to call down fire from heaven to consume them, but Jesus rebuke them. From this point on, there will be much rejection. Those who seek to follow Jesus will learn that the cost of discipleship can be high. But Jesus, knowing that He will pay the ultimate price, proceeds to Jerusalem.

For Reflection: Where does God call me to go in my life of discipleship? What must I let go of to follow effectively? Does my freedom from the law make me slave to sin, or do I strive to practice responsibility by serving others through love?

## The Jubilee Year of Mercy

December 8, 2015-November 20, 2016

*"It is a favorable time to heal wounds, a time to offer everyone the way of Forgiveness and Reconciliation."*

**Holy Year of Mercy:** The Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us, "that for believers the sacraments of the New Covenant are necessary for salvation." (CCC 1129) Jesus instituted the sacraments and He is at work through the Holy Spirit in the sacraments. Christ communicates the grace that each sacrament signifies. This sacramental grace is the grace of the Holy Spirit, given by Christ. (CCC 1129) These graces bear spiritual fruit in those who receive them with the required dispositions and cooperate with God's grace. Jesus says "I am the way, and the Truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father but through me." (Jn.14:6) In the sacraments, Jesus is the way to God our Father, the truth we are to receive, and the life we need to share in the divine life of the Holy Trinity. Jesus' parable of the sower (Mt. 13:4-9 and 18-23; Mk. 4:3-8 and 14-20; Lk. 5:5-8 and 11-15) can give us additional insight into the purpose of the sacraments. In this parable, the sower scatters the seed over the ground. Some seed never bears fruit but other seed bears abundant fruit. Jesus is the sower and the seeds can be seen as sacraments. Some Catholics, being spiritually lazy, indifferent or burdened by worldly cares, bear no fruit in their sacramental life. Other Catholics through a steady devotion to the Holy Eucharist, a robust prayer life, practice in the virtues, and performing the works of mercy, produce much fruit in their sacramental lives - 30 fold, 60 fold and a 100 fold. They are already sharing in the divine life of the Holy Trinity - God's purpose for the sacraments.

*Mercy grows within us as we reflect on how God has been merciful to us.*

## St. Peregrine Fund

In 2010, Bishop Campbell and the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women launched a cancer response initiative. Catholics for Cancer Prevention and Cure.

In 2016, this initiative was renamed the St. Peregrine Fund. The purpose of the fund is to provide resources for cancer screening, ethical research, and outreach to individuals and families dealing with all forms of cancer. In Pope Francis' apostolic exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium* (The Joy of the Gospel), we are called to respond to the Gospel, to live it more fully and deeply, to reach out to the poor and broken, to end injustice, to build peace. And to find the joy in all of it.

Pope Francis reminds us that we are capable of transforming lives for the better, as manifesting in the lives of everyday believers and in the many ministries, such as charities, medical providers, schools and universities that serve everyone in the community.

The St. Peregrine Fund will help cancer patients and their families with unmet needs through the Catholic hospital systems in our diocese. There are many low-income and underserved people in our 23-county diocese in need of such items as compression garments, wigs, genetic counseling, prosthetic breasts and bras, comfort bags, mammograms, medications, transportation, etc. The St. Peregrine Fund also will support research for treatment and the cure of cancer through the Stefanie Spielman Fund at The Ohio State University. One hundred percent of all donations will be divided equally among our Mount Carmel Healthcare Foundation in Columbus, The Genesis Healthcare Foundation in Zanesville, The Trinity Hospital Twin City Foundation in Dennison, and the Stefanie Spielman Fund for Breast Cancer.



### Notas Espirituales:

El primer y el segundo libro de los Reyes relatan la historia de los reyes de Israel y de Judá. Israel, el reino del norte, se separó de la nación después de la muerte de Salomón. En tiempos del profeta Elías, Israel fue gobernado por el rey Acab y su esposa, la Reina Jezabel. Juntos trataron de eliminar la adoración a Jehová de su nación. En el texto anterior a la lectura, el SEÑOR había ordenado a Elías ungir a un nuevo rey, "Jehú, hijo de Nimsi," en la espera de la muerte de Acab. Elías también está para ungir a su sucesor, Eliseo como el siguiente profeta en Israel. En la lectura de hoy, Eliseo corta sus vínculos con el pasado mediante la destrucción de su equipo de arado y los bueyes del sacrificio para una banquete final con su pueblo. Él está dispuesto a participar en su misión; y no hay vuelta atrás. En Gálatas, Pablo luchó con un evangelio rival que enseñó la obediencia a la ley de Moisés. El Escribe ahora para recordar a los Gálatas que por el bautismo, "ustedes" no están bajo la ley, sino "habeis sido llamado a la libertad." Pero la libertad requiere responsabilidad, porque sin control, la libertad puede llevarnos de nuevo "al yugo de la esclavitud." Más bien sírvanse unos a otros con amor. El viaje de Jesús a Jerusalén comienza con el Evangelio de hoy, un nuevo episodio de su vida. El objetivo de este punto es lo que significa Jerusalén. En el texto de Lucas, Jerusalén es la ciudad de la persecución y la muerte. Comenzando su viaje hacia el sur, Jesús debe pasar por territorio samaritano, "pero no le daría la bienvenida, porque el destino de su viaje era Jerusalén." Los discípulos están molestos por esto y quieren "hacer bajar fuego del cielo para consumirlos," pero Jesús los reprende. A partir de este momento, habrá mucho rechazo. Los que tratan de seguir a Jesús aprenderán que el costo del discipulado puede ser alto. Pero Jesús, sabiendo que va a pagar el precio más alto, procede a Jerusalén. Para reflexionar: ¿Dónde me llama Dios que vaya en mi vida como discipulado? ¿Qué tengo que dejar de lado para seguir el camino que Dios quiere? ¿Mi libertad de la ley me hace esclavo del pecado, o debo tratar de practicar la responsabilidad por el servicio a los demás a través del amor?
