Spiritual Notes:

The Book of Ecclesiastes is usually dated to the third century BC, a time of oppression under foreign rule. In light of this, we can understand why the author seems pessimistic: "All things are vanity!" One toils with wisdom and knowledge and skill, and yet to another who has not labored over it, he must leave prosperity. Our author writes with an overwhelming sense of futility about life. Yet in this book, we eventually encounter a developing sense of a future reward. Continuing with our reading from Colossians, we are called to seek what is above, a message that ties in well with the Gospel text. To share in the resurrection of Christ means to be called to live a new life, putting on the new self which is being renewed in the image of its creator. The parable of the rich fool echoes the futility of Ecclesiastes. The rich man learns that all his wealth is useless to him at the moment of death. Expanding on words, "one's life does not consist of possessions," Jesus encourages the crowd to focus on rather heavenly treasure, along with possessions. By sharing his abundance with his neighbors, the rich man could have done this, but he chooses to ignore others and rely on his wealth. The text interestingly says his land produced a bountiful harvest; implying that the rich man had nothing to do with it. In the biblical mind, it is God who provides the harvest. This foolish one leaves God out of the equation here to his own detriment.

For reflection: Do I work for the things of heaven as well as the things on Earth? Do I approach life with the pessimism of Ecclesiastes, or am I able to see and celebrate life as a gift from God?

Holy Year of Mercy: Sacrament of the Eucharist. To understand Jesus' purpose for the Holy Eucharist, every Catholic should carefully read the sixth chapter of the Gospel of John. It leaves no doubt as to what the Eucharist is. As God provides us with food for our bodies, so He provides us spiritual food (Himself) for our souls. "During the meal he [Jesus] took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. 'Take this,' he said, 'this is my body.' He likewise took a cup, gave thanks and passed it to them, and they all drank from it. He said to them: 'this is my blood, the blood of the covenant, to be poured out on behalf of many.' (Mk. 14: 22-24) The Apostle Paul tells us that when we receive the Holy Eucharist, we share in the body and blood of Christ. (1 Cor. 10: 16) But Saint Paul warns us, "This means that whoever eats the bread and drinks the cup of the Lord unworthily sins against the body and blood of the Lord." (1 Cor. 11:27) The Catechism of the Catholic Church declares that the Eucharist is "the source and summit of the Christian life." All the other sacraments are bound up with the Eucharist and oriented toward it." (CCC 1324) The Eucharist is an abundant treasury of God's mercy. Holy Communion augments our union with Jesus, strengthens our resistance and separates us from sin, enhances the unity of the Mystical Body of Christ, and is a pledge of the glory to come in eternity. The truth is that the Holy Eucharist is our direct and intimate encounter with the all-holy God.

Mercy grows within us as we reflect on how God has been merciful to us.

Notas Espirituales:

El libro de Eclesiastés se suele fecharse en el siglo III antes de Cristo, un tiempo de opresión bajo el dominio extranjero. A la luz de esto, podemos entender por qué el autor parece pesimista: "Todo es vanidad!" Se afana con la sabiduría y el conocimiento y habilidad, y sin embargo, a otro que no ha trabajado sobre ella, hay que dejar la prosperidad. O autor escribe con una abrumadora sensación de futilidad de la vida. Sin embargo, en este libro nos encontramos con el tiempo el desarrollo de un sentido de la azada en una recompensa futura. Continuando con nuestra lectura de Colosenses, estamos llamados a buscar lo que está por encima de un mensaje que los tiempos en bien con el texto del Evangelio. Para compartir en la resurrección de Cristo significa ser llamado a vivir una nueva vida, la puesta en el nuevo auto que se va renovando a imagen de su creador. La parábola del rico insensato se hace eco de la inutilidad de Eclesiastés. El hombre rico se entera de que toda su riqueza es inútil para él en el momento de la muerte. Ampliando las palabras, "la vida de uno no consiste en posesiones. Jesús anima a la gente a centrarse en recoger tesoros celestiales junto con las posesiones iniciales. Al compartir su abundancia con sus vecinos, el rico, el hombre podría haber hecho esto, pero él decide hacer caso omiso de los demás y confiar en sus riquezas. El texto dice curiosamente su tierra produjo una cosecha abundante, lo que implica que el hombre rico no tenía nada que ver con eso. En la mentalidad bíblica, Dios es el que proporciona la cosecha. Este absurdo se deja a Dios fuera de la ecuación para su propio perjuicio.

Para reflexionar: ¿Trabajo de las cosas del cielo, así como las que están en la Tierra? ¿Me acerco a la vida con el pesimismo del Eclesiastés, o soy capaz de ver y celebrar la mentira como un don de Dios
