Spiritual Notes:

As we enter the final weeks of the church year, our readings and prayers turn to thoughts of Jesus' second coming. In the Gospel Jesus uses Old Testament imagery for the "Day of the Lord." He predicts the sun will be darkened....the moon will not give its light....stars will be falling from the sky. These events will be followed by Jesus' return, when he will appear "with great power and glory." As the one who comes to judge, "then he will send out the angels and gather his elect." In light of this Jesus calls us to "Be watchful! Be alert!" The Book of Daniel is an example of apocalyptic literature. It is dated to the middle of the second century BC when Israel was under the dominion of the Syrians. In this era, the people looked to the future when God would rescue them. Written in Hebrew and Aramaic, the book contains the oldest biblical text professing belief in "everlasting life"; this term is not found in earlier books of the Bible. The text of our reading encourages us to live so as to have our names "written in the book" when the Day of the Lord finally comes. The Author of Hebrews contrasts the offering of the priests of Israel, who offer "frequently those same sacrifices that can never take away sins," with that of Christ, who "offered one sacrifice for sins." "By one offering he has made perfect forever those who are being consecrated." Quoting the prophet Jeremiah, our author says that as a result of this sacrifice, God will remember our sins no more. Since Christ's sacrifice achieves this and brings us forgiveness, "there is no longer offering for sin."

For reflection: Do I reflect on the belief that Christ will come again? What times of oppression exist in our world? How can I help liberate people from them in this upcoming Jubilee of Mercy?

Notas Espirituales:

Al entrar en la última semana del año litúrgico, las lecturas y oraciones se dirigen a los pensamientos de Jesús de la segunda venida. En el Evangelio, Jesús utiliza imágenes del Antiguo Testamento para el "Día del Señor." Él predice, "el sol se oscurecerá, ... la luna no dará su resplandor, ... estrellas caerán del cielo." Estos eventos serán seguidos por el regreso de Jesús, cuando Él aparecerá "con gran poder y gloria." Como el que viene a juzgar, "entonces enviará a los ángeles y reunirá a sus elegidos." A la luz de esto, Jesús nos llama "Estén atento! Estén alerta!"

El libro de Daniel es un ejemplo de la literatura apocalíptica. Está fechada a mediados del segundo siglo antes de Cristo, cuando Israel estaba bajo el dominio de los Sirios. En esta época, la gente miraba hacia el futuro cuando Dios los rescato. Escrito en hebreo y arameo, el libro contiene el texto bíblico la creencia más antigua profesante en la "vida eterna" Este término no se encuentra en el libro anterior de la Biblia. El texto de nuestra lectura nos anima a vivir para tener nuestros nombres "escrito en el libro" cuando el Día del Señor finalmente llegue.

El autor de Hebreos contrasta la ofrenda de los sacerdotes de Israel, que ofrecen "frecuentemente esos mismos sacrificios que nunca pueden quitar los pecados," con el de Cristo, que "ofreció un solo sacrificio por los pecados." "Por una sola ofrenda hizo perfectos para siempre a los santificados." Indicando al profeta Jeremías, nuestro autor dice que como resultado de este sacrificio, Dios se acordará de nuestros pecados. Desde el sacrificio de Cristo logra esto y nos trae el perdón, "ya no hay ofrenda por el pecado."

Para reflexionar: ¿Debo reflexionar sobre la creencia de que Cristo vendrá otra vez? ¿Qué tipos de opresión existen en nuestro mundo? ¿Cómo puedo ayudar a liberar a la gente de ellos en este próximo jubileo de la Misericordia?
