Spiritual Notes:

Today's text from Genesis paired with the teaching on prayer from Luke's Gospel, illustrates Abraham's relationship with God and his role as one who intercedes on behalf of his people. God shares with Abraham His intention to punish the citizens of Sodom and Gomorrah who pleads on their behalf. Would God, "the judge of all the world," "sweep away the innocent with the guilty?" God's mercy is such that even if 10 righteous people are found He will "spare the whole place for their sake." In Colossians, we are reminded that we were buried with Him in Baptism and raised with Him through faith. The early church saw the strong connection between Baptism and death; we die to sin and rise to new life, as though the baptismal font were a tomb in which we share in Christ's death and resurrection. Through Baptism, we become God's children so we can address God as Abba, Father. In giving us the Our Father, Jesus is teaching us how to pray. Our prayer should be simple and direct, acknowledging our dependence on God. Jesus goes on to advise persistence "Ask... seek... knock," He tells us, for God watches over us and cares for us as a living parent. Luke's unique addition to this teaching is that God will give the Holy Spirit to those who ask. It is this Spirit, which guided Jesus, which we should be seeking in our prayer.

For Reflection: Abraham's dialogue with God serves as an example of the intercessory prayer. Are my prayers of intercession sometimes focused on others, or are they just concerned with my own wants and needs? Is my prayer one of actively "asking seeking, and knocking?" Or am I more resigned to accept whatever comes my way and attributes it to God's will?

Please keep in your prayers, Joseph Petrella, age 90, who died on Friday, July 8, 2016. May his soul and all the souls of our faithful departed rest in peace. Please keep his family, also in your prayers.

The Jubilee Year of Mercy December 8, 2015-November 20, 2016

Holy Year of Mercy: Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). Jesus very specifically gave His Church the power to forgive sins. He told the apostles, "If you forgive men's sins, they are forgiven them; if you hold them bound, they are held bound." (Jn. 20:23) This scripture passage provides the basis for confession. Sadly, many Catholics have a shallow understanding of the sacrament of confession. They see it as just the telling of sins and receiving absolution from the priest. It is much more than that. Saint Faustina (1905-1938) said that Jesus told her that confession was the tribunal of His mercy. Confession fosters Christian humility in the person using the sacrament. In confession the person has a direct encounter with Jesus Christ through the priest. Jesus is present with the priest in the confessional. Through the priest Jesus, in His mercy, hears the sins being confessed, forgives the sinner, and provides mercy-filled graces for spiritual healing of the sin-damaged soul and strengthening the penitent to resist sin. Confession restores the penitent to a right relationship with God, the Church and their neighbors. For those confessing mortal sin, their soul is restored to life with God and the Holy Spirit making their soul His holy temple again. The longer one remains away from the sacrament of confession, the more unworthy they become to receive Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. They also deprive themselves of graces that greatly aid their eternal salvation. Regular confession is good for the soul.

Mercy grows within us as we reflect on how God has been merciful to us.

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Volunteer's Code of Conduct

Our children are the most important gifts God has entrusted to us. As a volunteer, I promise to strictly follow the rules and guidelines in this Volunteer's Code of Conduct as a condition of my providing services to the children and youth of our [parish, school, facility, diocese, etc.].

As a volunteer, I will:

- Treat everyone with respect, loyalty, patience, integrity, courtesy, dignity, and consideration.
- Avoid situations where I am alone with children and/or youth at Church activities.
- Use positive reinforcement rather than criticism, competition, or comparison when working with children and/or youth.
- Refuse to accept expensive gifts from children and/or youth or their parents without prior written approval from the pastor or administrator.
- Refrain from giving expensive gifts to children and/or youth without prior written approval from the parents or guardian and the pastor or administrator.
- Report suspected abuse to the pastor, administrator, or appropriate supervisor and [the local Child Protection Services agency]. I understand that failure to report suspected abuse to civil authorities is, according to the law, a misdemeanor.
- Cooperate fully in any investigation of abuse of children and/or youth.

As a volunteer, I will not:

- Smoke or use tobacco products in the presence of children and/or youth.
- Use, possess, or be under the influence of alcohol at any time while volunteering.
- Use, possess, or be under the influence of illegal drugs at any time.
- Pose any health risk to children and/or youth (i.e., no fevers or other contagious situations).
- Strike, spank, shake, or slap children and/or youth.
- Humiliate, ridicule, threaten, or degrade children and/or youth.
- Touch a child and/or youth in a sexual or other inappropriate manner.
- Use any discipline that frightens or humiliates children and/or youth.
- Use profanity in the presence of children and/or youth.

Notas Espirituales:

El texto de hoy, desde el Génesis, junto con la enseñanza sobre la oración del Evangelio de Lucas, muestra la relación de Abraham con Dios y su función como uno que intercede en nombre de su pueblo. Dios comparte con Abraham su intención de castigar a los habitantes de Sodoma y Gomorra que aboga en su favor. Querrá Dios, "El juez de toda la tierra," "destruir al inocente con el culpable?." La misericordia de Dios es tal que si se encuentran incluso 10 personas justas, él "perdonará a todo este lugar por amor" En Colosenses se nos recuerda que "fuimos sepultados con él en el bautismo y resucitado con El por la fe." La iglesia primitiva vio la fuerte conexión entre el bautismo y la muerte, nuestra muerte al pecado y resucitar a una nueva vida, como si la pila bautismal era una tumba en la que participamos en la muerte y resurrección de Cristo. Por el bautismo nos convertimos en hijos de Dios para que podamos dirigirnos a Dios como Abba, Padre. Al darnos el Padre Nuestro, Jesús nos enseña a orar. Nuestra oración debe ser simple y directa, reconociendo nuestra dependencia de Dios. Jesús pasa a asesorar a la persistencia en la oración. No debemos sentarnos y esperar a que la bondad de Dios. "Pregunte ... busque ... llame," nos dice, por Dios vela sobre nosotros y nos cuida como un padre amoroso. Además único de Lucas a esta enseñanza es que Dios "dará el Espíritu Santo a los que lo piden." Es este Espíritu, que guió a Jesús, que debemos estar buscando en nuestra oración.

Para la reflexión: el diálogo de Abraham con Dios sirve como un ejemplo de intercesor a la oración. ¿Están mis oraciones de intercesión a veces enfocadas en los demás, o simplemente estoy preocupado por mis propios deseos y necesidades? ¿Es una de mis oraciones activamente "preguntando, buscando y llamando?" O estoy más resignado a aceptar lo que cada vez se me presenta y lo atribuyo a la voluntad de Dios?



Por favor, recuerde en su oración, a todos los enfermos, al salir de casa, y la recuperación de nuestra parroquia. Además, orar por aquellos que sufren de condiciones físicas o mentales.
