Pray for the Priest, Deacon, or Seminarian of the Day: Posted on the bulletin boards are calendars with the names of Priests, Deacons, and Seminararians. As you come into the church, you may want to look at the calendar and pray for the designated person of the day.

Spiritual Notes:

In today's Gospel, Jesus is dining not with sinners but "at the home of one of the leading Pharisees." The guests "were choosing the places of honor at the table," but Jesus tells them to "take the lowest place" to avoid the possibly embarrassing situation. Most people in Jesus' day invited their social equals or those who were more distinguished in order to improve their own social standing. Jesus tells us that we should invite those normally overlooked by society. This image reflects Jesus' mission not just to the righteous but also to sinners. Reinforcing that message, Sirach instructs us, "Humble yourself and you will find favor with God." God desires us to be humble, for in our humility we glorify God. In this collection of proverbs, Sirach presents advice that will benefit the wise, whose mind "appreciates proverbs." The former name of the book, Ecclesiasticus or Church Book is an indication of the book's status in the early church, where it was quoted extensively in instructing the faithful in matters of morality. The call to humility is an appropriate today as it was then. The writer of Hebrews compares God's revelation to Moses on Mount Sinai to God's self revelation in Jesus. The first was accompanied by a blazing fire... gloomy darkness... storm and a trumpet blast, which inspired fear in Moses and the Israelites. Now, he says, God calls us to Mount Zion and the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem. In Jesus, God is no longer unapproachable or terrifying. Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, has reconciled us to God and we have no need to fear anymore.

For Reflection: Is humility a virtue I try to practice regularly? How an Jesus' example of humbling himself inspires me?

Save the Date

The United States Catholic Bishops have declared September 9, 2016, to be a Day of Prayer for Peace and Reconciliation. Bishop Campbell will celebrate a Blue Mass in honor of the brave men and women of law enforcement at St. Timothy Parish in Columbus on the evening of September 8th. **St. Joseph Parish will hold a special day of prayer and fasting on the Feast Day of St. Michael - patron saint of police officers - Thursday, September 29th.**

Our parish *Day of Prayer for Civil Peace* will begin with a Vigil Mass at 6:00 p.m. on the evening before followed by 24 hours of adoration in the church and a closing prayer service beginning at 6:00 p.m. on September 29th. A communal Rosary will be prayed at midnight and noon with several opportunities throughout the day to hear the Word of God proclaimed and to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Holy Year of Mercy:

The Church recognizes three "orders" within the sacrament of Holy Orders: the order of bishops, the order of priests, and the order of deacons. The ministerial priesthood of bishops and priests serves the communion of the Church by building up the Body of Christ.

Bishops and priests share in the priesthood of Christ; deacons, ordained to a degree of service, are meant to help and serve them. The order of bishops consist of those who are transmitters of the apostolic line. With Episcopal consecration, bishops receive the fullness of Holy Orders and fulfill the Messianic roles of Christ: to sanctify, to teach, and to rule. Each bishop has pastoral care of a particular Church entrusted to him. The order of priests are coworkers of the bishops. They are consecrated by the bishop in order to preach the Gospel, shepherd the faithful, and celebrate divine worship. In communion with the bishop, the priest is ordained for the Eucharist. The deacon is ordained to ministry and can distribute Holy Communion, assist at and bless marriages, proclaim the Gospel, preach, preside at funeral services, and perform ministries of charity. In his encyclical *Mediator Dei* (1947), Pope Pius XII explained, "It is the same priest, Christ Jesus, whose sacred person his minister truly represents. Now the minister, by reason of the sacerdotal consecration which he has received, is truly made like to the high priest and possesses the authority to act in the power and place of the person of Christ himself."

Alpha is a program for all people of all backgrounds and viewpoints, and provides an opportunity to explore the purpose of life and the existence of God while learning more about Jesus. It is designed to enhance your personal relationship with Jesus, and provide you with the tools to bring Jesus to others.

The course starts on September 19th and runs for 10 weeks. Small groups meet during the nine-week sessions in a relaxed setting for a meal, to view a video, then gather in informal small groups for a laid back discussion about the video's content.

Notas Espirituales:

En el Evangelio de hoy, Jesús está comiendo no con los pecadores pero "en la casa de uno de los principales Fariseos." Los convidados "escogían los primeros lugares de honor en la mesa," pero Jesús les dice "ocupen el último lugar" para evitar una situación vergonzosa. La mayoría de la gente en los tiempos de Jesús invitaba a la gente de igual posición social o los que eran "más distinguidos" con el fin de mejorar su propia posición social. Jesús nos dice que debemos invitar los que normalmente se pasan por alto por la sociedad. Esta imagen refleja la misión de Jesús, no sólo para los justos sino también para los pecadores.

Reforzando este mensaje, Eclesiástico nos enseña, "a humillarnos.../ y así encontrar la gracia de Dios." Dios anhela que seamos humildes, por que en nuestra humildad glorificamos a Dios. En esta colección de proverbios, Eclesiásticos presenta consejos que beneficiará a los sabios cuya mente "valora proverbios." El antiguo nombre del libro, Eclesiástico o "libro de la iglesia," es una indicación de la situación del libro en la iglesia primitiva, donde fue citado ampliamente en la instrucción de los fieles en cuestiones de moralidad. La llamada a la humanidad es tan necesaria hoy como lo fue entonces. El escritor de Hebreos compara la revelación de Dios a Moisés en el Monte Sinaí para la autor revelación de Dios en Jesús. El primeo fue acompañado por "una llama de fuego... sombría oscuridad / ...tormenta y un sonido de trompeta," que inspiró temor en Moisés y los israelitas. Ahora, el dice, Dios nos llama al "Monte Sión / y la ciudad de Dios viviente, a la Jerusalén celestial." En Jesús Dios ya no es inalcanzable o aterrador. Jesús, "el mediador de una nueva alianza, nos ha reconocido con Dios, y no tenemos necesidad de temer más.

Para la reflexión: ¿Es la humildad una virtud que intento practicar regularmente? ¿Cómo puede el ejemplo de la humildad de Jesús a mi mismo inspirarme?



Por favor, recuerde en su oración, a todos los enfermos, al salir de casa, y la recuperación de nuestra parroquia. Además, orar por aquellos que sufren de condiciones físicas o mentales.
