Day: Posted on the bulletin boards are calendars with the names of Priests, Deacons, and Seminarians. As you come into the church, you may want to look at the calendar and pray for the designated person of the day.

Spiritual Notes:

Amos, a prophet of the northern kingdom in the eighth century, B.C. speaks words of judgment against those who "trample upon the needy." He is one of the strongest prophets to denounce injustice. The people could hardly wait for the holy days to be over, that we may sell our grain, and fix the weights and measures for cheating. Though Israel is waiting for the "Day of the Lord" Amos tells them that it will be a day of judgment and justice, not a day of joy, for God will punish them for their sins. The writer of First Timothy asks us to pray for everyone, for this is good and pleasing to God our savior, who wills everyone to be saved. By praying for kings and for all in authority, we do God's will; when we pray for them, we cannot help but think of them in a different light. The understanding in early Christianity was that they should live as good citizens and extension of rules for conduct within a household. As all people are children of God, we are united as one family and so we should live in all devotion and dignity. In a careful reading of today's Gospel, we see that the dishonest steward was commended not for his dishonesty, but for acting prudently. The steward acts sensibly to secure his future. By lowering the amount each debtor owes his master, he gains favor with the debtors. In Jesus' comments following the parable, we hear Him calling the disciples to have similar sense. The children of the world are more prudent in dealing with their own generation than are the children of the light (referring to the Christians). This parable addressed specifically to "his disciples," teaches us that while we are citizens of heaven, we still have to deal with the realities of this world, and we should do this with the good sense of the steward.

For reflection: What is my attitude toward the poor? Do I support a system that tramples on them or assists them?



Lord Jesus, together with the Father and the Holy Spirit, we love You, we praise You and we thank you for all the graces and blessings

You have poured out on our parish. Still, we long to love You and seek You even more. We desire to love You as passionately as You love each one of us, personally and completely.

Call us from the heart to discover You this coming year through our Alpha course. May it be fruitful, so that our love for You burns in our hearts and spills out beyond our parish walls in a new evangelization of our community.

Holy Year of Mercy: Marriage is a covenantal relationship. The indissolubility of the marriage covenant images the absolutely faithful character of God's steadfast love for humankind. Marriage as a covenant emphasizes the sacred character of marriage where the husband and wife enter into a permanent bond of kinship and live with

special fidelity required of conjugal love. Marriage also has a contractual aspect to it, involving the mutual interchange of rights and duties, binding in justice. Marriage is unique as a contract, because its nature is determined by God, not the spouses or society. A man and a woman can freely choose to marry; but, having married, they are bound to respect the sacred nature God has given to this singular covenant-contract. For the marriage to flourish, the married couple must exercise chastity within their marriage. They should seek to purify marital intercourse of any element of self-seeking so that it becomes wholly an act of mutual and loving self-donation to the other. Saint Augustine (354-430 AD) maintained that marriage is good because of three fundamental values or goods. He said, "Let these nuptial goods be the objects of our love: offspring, fidelity, the unbreakable bond..." He believed that these three values give dignity to marriage. Jesus tells us that it is only by "losing" (i.e., giving) ourselves that we can "find" ourselves (Mt. 10:39). So it is in marriage.

Mercy grows within us as we reflect on how God has been merciful to us.

Second Collection – September 24 and 25, 2016, Catholic Charities U.S.A.

Over the last couple of weeks, we have seen the terrible news of the historic flooding in Louisiana. The region is experiencing what is being called the worst domestic disaster since Hurricane Sandy. As many as 60,000 homes have been damaged, with nearly 20,000 people being rescued from the flood waters. Lives have been cruelly altered. As a result, Bishop Campbell requests that all parishes in the Diocese of Columbus participate in the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' emergency collection to assist the victims of the 2016 Louisiana floods. Notas Espirituales:

Amós un profeta del reino del norte durante el siglo VIII antes de Cristo, habla palabras de juicio contra aquellos, que "pisotean a los más necesitados." Él es uno de los profetas más fuertes para denunciar la injusticia. La gente difícilmente podía esperar a que los días santos "sean para poder vender el grano" y la medida de pesos "para engañar ." A pesar de que en Israel son pesos para el Día del Señor," Amós les dijo que será un día del juicio y justicia, no es un día de alegría, porque Dios los castigará por sus pecados. El escritor de la Primera de Timoteo nos invita a orar a "cada uno de nosotros," porque "esto es bueno y agradable a Dios, nuestro Salvador, / pues él quiere que todos los hombres se salven." Orando "por los reyes y por todos en la autoridad," que hacemos la voluntad de Dios cuanto oramos por ellos, no podemos dejar de pensar en ello desde una perspectiva diferente. Debajo de la posición en el Cristianismo primitivo era que debían vivir como buenos habitantes - una extensión de reglas por conducta dentro del hogar. Como toda la gente, son hijos de Dios, estamos unidos como una sola familia, y así debemos vivir, con "toda devoción y dignidad." En la lectura del Evangelio de hoy, vemos que el "administrador injusto" fue elogiado no por su falta de honradez, sino "por actuar con prudencia." El mayordomo actúa con sensatez para asegurar su futuro. Al reducir la cantidad que cada deudor le debe a su amo, gana el favor de los deudores. En los comentarios de Jesús después de la parábola, escuchamos el llamado a los discípulos a tener un sentido similar. "Los niños de este mundo /son más prudentes tratándose de su gente que son los hijos de la luz." Esta parábola dirigida específicamente a los "discípulos," nos enseña mientras nosotros somos habitantes del cielo, todavía tenemos que enfrentar con la realidad de este mundo, y deberíamos hacerlo con el buen sentido del administrador.

Para reflexión: ¿Cuál es mi actitud hacia los pobres? ¿Apoyo un sistema que pisotea sobre ellos o les ayude?
