Spiritual Notes:

The prophet Amos provides us with another “woe” this weekend. This one is addressed to those who are complacent. While Zion is the mountain of Jerusalem, the mount of Samaria represents the northern kingdom. Thus our text can be read as addressed to citizens of both nations. The prophet speaks of those who are “lying upon beds of ivory,” a sign of excessive indulgence. Like the rich man in today’s Gospel, they are blinded by their wealth and cannot see the poverty that surrounds them. To them the prophet speaks words of judgment. The encouragement addressed to Timothy today is also for each of us. Timothy, a fellow missionary with Paul, is a leader of the church at Ephesus. Through baptism, God calls us to “pursue righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness.” Our lives are meant to witness to life in God. The parable of the rich man and Lazarus reinforces Amos’ message. Purple clothes were sign of wealth in Jesus’ day. The contrast between the description of the rich man, “who dressed in purple garments and fine linen,” and Lazarus, who was “covered with sores,” tells us that they are at opposite ends of the socioeconomic scale. While the rich man “dined sumptuously each day,” Lazarus did not. The added detail that the dogs “used to come and lick his sores” paints his situation as even more dire. Part of the tragedy of this story is that the rich man should have known better than to ignore Lazarus, “lying at his door;” they are both children of Abraham.

For Reflection: Where can I find the Lazaruses in society today? What in my life prevents me from seeing them?

Holy Year of Mercy: Jesus Christ raised marriage to a sacrament; thereby, giving indissolubility a new significance, becoming a sign of the love, faithful to death, of Christ for His Church. Every husband and wife and those planning marriage should carefully read and reflect on Saint Paul’s Letter to the Ephesians, Chapter 5, versus 22-32. He reveals how the sacrament of marriage really reflects Christ very love for His Church. The sacrament of marriage is a

major part of the divine plan for the good of persons (spouses and children) as well of society. Sacramental marriage involves three persons in the union: the husband, the wife, and most importantly Jesus. Jesus declares, “Where two or three are gathered in My name, there am I in their midst.” (Mt. 18:20) “By virtue of this sacrament, as spouses fulfill their conjugal and family obligations, they are penetrated with the Spirit of Christ, who fills their whole lives with faith, hope, and charity. Thus they increasingly advance towards their own perfection, as well as towards their mutual sanctification.” (Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World,48) Marriage as the highest form of human community, by being a sacrament, is sanctified and grace is conferred so that this union of the sexes can be infused with supernatural love and bring the couple to eternal salvation.

Mercy grows within us as we reflect on how God has been merciful to us.

Un rosario común en Inglés se rezara a la medianoche y al mediodía con varias oportunidades durante el día para escuchar la Palabra de Dios proclamada y para recibir el Sacramento de la Reconciliación.

Notas Espirituales:

El profeta Amos nos dice "¡ay de ustedes" este fin de semana. Éste está dirigido a "aquellos que están satisfechos." Aunque Sión es el monte de Jerusalén, el monte de Samaria representa el reino del norte. Así, nuestro texto puede ser leído dirigido a la gente de ambas naciones. El profeta habla de aquellos que están "mintiendo en camas de marfil," un signo de la indulgencia excesiva. Al igual que el hombre rico en el Evangelio de hoy, ellos están cegados por su riqueza y no pueden ver la pobreza que los rodea. Para ellos el profeta habla palabras de juicio. El impulso dirigió a Timoteo hoy es también para cada uno de nosotros. Timoteo, un compañero misionero de Pablo, es un líder de la iglesia en Éfeso. A través del bautismo, Dios nos llama a "seguir "la justicia, / la devoción, la fe, el amor, la paciencia, y la mansedumbre." Nuestras vidas están destinadas para presenciar la vida en Dios. La parábola del hombre rico que Lázaro refuerza en el mensaje de Amos. Ropas púrpuras eran un signo de riqueza en la época de Jesús. El contraste entre la descripción del hombre rico, "que se vestía de color púrpura y ropa fina," Lázaro, que estaba "cubierto de llagas," nos dice que ellos se encuentran en los extremos opuestos de la escala socioeconómica. Mientras que el hombre rico "cenaba lujosamente cada día," Lázaro no lo hizo. El detalle añadido que los perros "utilizados se acercaban a lamer las llagas "pinta su situación aún más grave. Parte de la tragedia de esta historia es que el hombre rico debería haber sabido que no podía ignorar a Lázaro," postrado a su puerta," que los dos son hijos de Abraham.
