Spiritual Notes:

As our liturgical year winds down, our readings turn more to images of final judgment. As a church, we look forward to Christ's return in glory. The prophet Malachi, a post exilic prophet, calls the people to task for not remaining faithful. While calling the people to reform their lives now, he reminds them that the day is coming when all the proud and all evildoers will struggle. While destruction awaits the wicked, good things await you who fear my name. The Lord says, for the sun of justice will bring healing to them. To prepare for the day of judgment, we should live honorable lives, Paul tells us. In Thessalonians, we hear advice given to the community to follow the example of Paul, who night and day worked so as not to burden any of you. The example of the apostle is put forward as a model for the believers to follow. We should be busy about the Lord's work so that when He comes we will be pleasing to Him. In today's Gospel, Jesus speaks of the coming times of trial. These verses probably reflect the experience of Luke's community. In AD 70, the Romans destroyed the temple of Jerusalem, leaving no stone upon another stone. We know from the letters of John and Paul that some people were presenting themselves as Christ returned to bring about the end of the world. Christians are cautioned about this. Even in our own day, we find evangelists telling us that we are living in the end times. What Luke's church know is that some of them will be persecuted because of their faith. Some are even betrayed by family members. In Acts of the Apostles, we will see Jesus' apostles handed over to the synagogues and to prisons and led before kings and governors because of Jesus' name. But Jesus assures us, by your perseverance you will secure your lives. *For Reflection: How am I preparing for Christ's second coming? What price have I paid for my faith?*

Marge and I and our family – both immediate and extended – would like to say thank you for all of your wonderful acts of kindness and consolation following the passing of both my father and his sister (my godmother) last week. The impact of losing these two very special people, who were present at my baptism and who we had hoped would be present for my ordination, is surreal but through your support has been much easier to endure. Holy Year of Mercy:

Jesus is the Divine Mercy.

He told St. Faustina, "I have opened My Heart as a living fountain of mercy. Let all souls draw life from it. Let them approach this sea of mercy with great trust." (Diary, 1520) The message of Divine Mercy is this: ask for God's mercy, be merciful to others, and completely trust in Jesus. Jesus also told St. Faustina, "I am Love and Mercy itself.

When a soul approaches Me with trust, I fill it with such an abundance of graces that it cannot contain them within itself, but radiates them to other souls." (Diary, 1074) If we step back and take the time to view the world around us, we will find a world that is losing the understanding of mercy and the ability to live it. Jesus has told us that we will not have peace until we turn to and live in the Divine Mercy. He bluntly told St. Faustina, "If they will not adore My mercy, they will perish for all eternity." (Diary, 965) The Holy Year of Mercy that Pope Francis bestowed upon the Church is a special opportunity for us to incorporate the Divine Mercy into our daily lives and spread it to those around us. Mercy is central to the faith that Jesus gave us through the Apostles. It is necessary for our spiritual health and well-being.

Notas Espirituales:

A medida de que nuestro año litúrgico va terminando, las lecturas se vuelven más a las imágenes del juicio final. Como iglesia estamos deseando el regreso de Cristo en su gloria.

El profeta Malaquías, profeta de después del exilio, pide a la gente cuentas por no permanecer fieles. Mientras llama al pueblo a enmendar sus vidas ahora, les recuerda que "ya viene el día.../ cuando todos los soberbios malvados serán como la paja." Mientras que la destrucción espera a los malvados, las cosas buenas esperan a "los que temen a mi nombre", dice el Señor, porque "brillará el sol de justicia" que les traerá la sanación en sus rayos.

Para prepararse para el día del juicio, debemos vivir una vida honorable, Pablo nos dice. En Tesalonicenses escuchamos consejos dados a la comunidad a seguir el ejemplo de Pablo, quien "noche y día/... trabajó, para no ser carga de ninguno de nosotros." El ejemplo del apóstol se presenta como un modelo para los creyentes a seguir. Debemos estar ocupados por el trabajo del Señor para que cuando venga seamos agradables a él. En el evangelio de hoy Jesús habla de los tiempos próximos de prueba. Sus versículos reflejan probablemente la experiencia de la comunidad de Lucas. En el año 70 AD los Romanos destruyeron el templo de Jerusalén, sin dejar "piedra sobre piedra." Sabemos por las cartas de Juan y Pablo que algunas personas estaban presentándose como Cristo volviendo a provocar el fin del mundo. A los cristianos se les advierte acerca de esto. Incluso en nuestros días, encontramos evangelistas diciéndonos estamos viviendo "el fin del mundo." Lo que la iglesia de Lucas conoce es que alguno de ellos serán perseguidos a causa de su fe. Algunos incluso traicionados por miembros de la familia. En los Hechos de los Apóstoles veremos a los apóstoles de Jesús entregados "a la sinagogas y a las cárceles" y "llevados ante los reyes y gobernadores/ por el (nombre de Jesús)." Pero, Jesús nos asegura." con nuestra perseverancia salvará a nuestras vidas."

Para Reflexión: ¿Cómo me preparo para la segunda venida de Cristo? ¿Qué precio he pagado por mi fe?
