Spiritual Notes:

The story of David's selection to be Israel's second King shows us that God does not see as mortals see: "the Lord looks into the heart." The prophet Samuel is sent to Bethlehem to find a new King for Israel, for God's favor no longer rests on Saul. David is selected only after Samuel has been presented with Jesse's seven other sons. David, the youngest, is tending the sheep. He is the one chosen by the Lord, so Samuel anoints him, and the spirit of the Lord rushed upon David. "Live as children of the light," Paul encourages the Ephesians. He is using imagery familiar to the Greek world: The dualism of light and darkness. "You were once darkness," he says, referring to their former lives without Christ, "but now you are light in the Lord." Since we belong to the Lord, we should strive to do what is pleasing to the Lord. Jesus' encounter with the man born blind employs the dualism of light and darkness we see in Ephesians. In the Gospel, darkness is associated with blindness and sin, while light is associated with truth and God. In the previous chapter, Jesus declared, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will have the light of life." The man born blind has his eyes opened by Jesus and comes to believe in Him, expressed by his act of worship. But the Pharisees, who can physically see, refuse to believe in Jesus and so stand in judgment. They condemn Jesus for violating the Sabbath by making clay and healing, actions forbidden by their interpretation of the Law. They have become blind, but this blindness is spiritual and perhaps harder to cure.

For Reflection: Am I satisfied to see with my eyes, or do I try to see with my heart? Do I keep the light of Christ, given to me at Baptism, burning brightly?

Lenten Reflections

Divine Mercy: In the first two temptations, Satan issued a challenge to Jesus, "If you are the Son of God..." Satan is demanding that Jesus prove His claim. This demand for proof runs throughout Jesus public ministry. If you, Christ, are really the Son, then you will have to demonstrate it more clearly than you are doing. Satan demands that Jesus turn stones into bread (Mt. 4: 3-4). During the Exodus, God fed his people with manna from heaven (Ex. 16: 13-15). It was a Jewish school of thought that the Messiah would feed the hungry with bread. The expected Messiah should be concerned first with bread for the hungry and the rest would come afterward. Satan is alluding to this expectation. Jesus refused Satan, but later He fed great numbers of people by multiplying loaves of bread. Why? Because the people first came to hear God's word and left everything behind to do so. It all boils down to whether we put God first or our material wants first. The multiplication of bread points to Jesus' perpetual miracle of bread, the Holy Eucharist. This is where we put God first and, in turn, God leads us toward our eternal salvation.

Notas Espirituales:

La historia de la selección de David para ser el segundo rey de Israel nos muestra que Dios no ve como los mortales ven: "el Señor mira el corazón." El profeta Samuel es enviado a Belén para encontrar un nuevo rey de Israel, por el favor de Dios ya no descansa sobre Saúl. David sólo se selecciona después de que Samuel se ha presentado con otros siete hijos de Isaí. David, el más joven, está "cuidando el rebaño." Él es el elegido por el Señor, por lo que Samuel lo unge, y "el espíritu del SEÑOR vino sobre David."

"Vive como hijos de la luz," Pablo anima a los Efesios. Él está usando imágenes familiares para el mundo Griego: El dualismo de la luz y la oscuridad. "Ustedes antes eran oscuridad, dice, refiriéndose a su anterior vida sin Cristo," pero ahora soy luz en el Señor "Desde que pertenecemos al Señor, debemos esforzarnos hacer "lo que es agradable al Señor."

El encuentro de Jesús con el ciego de nacimiento emplea el dualismo de la luz y la oscuridad que vimos en Efesios. En el Evangelio, la oscuridad se asocia con la ceguera y el pecado, mientras que la luz está asociada con la verdad y de Dios. En el capítulo anterior, Jesús declaró: "Yo soy la luz del mundo. El que me sigue... tendrá la luz de la vida." El ciego de nacimiento tiene sus ojos abiertos por Jesús y llega a creer en él, expresó por su acto de adoración. Pero los fariseos, que pueden físicamente ver, se niegan a creer en Jesús y lo que se destacan en el juicio. Condenan a Jesús por violar el sábado haciendo barro y curativas, acciones prohibidas por su interpretación de la ley. Se han convertido en ciego, pero esta ceguera es espiritual y tal vez más difícil de curar.

Para reflexionar: ¿Estoy satisfecho de ver con mis ojos, o trato de ver con el corazón? ¿Mantengo la luz de Cristo, que me han dado en el bautismo, la llama brillante?
