Spiritual Notes:

Today's reading from Acts gives us a sense of the earliest form of preaching in the apostolic community. Peter's words in the house of Cornelius, a Roman centurion and the first gentile to embrace Christianity, summarize the Christian Kerygma: Jesus, God's anointed one, was killed and rose from the dead. For Luke, the author of Acts, this is a fulfillment of God's words spoken by "all the prophets."

Paul tells the Colossians and us that by having a share in Christ's life through our baptism, we also have a share in His Resurrection. "When Christ.... appears in glory, we will have a share of that glory." By sharing in our death, Jesus gives us a share in His Resurrection, for we were raised with Christ. Paul goes on in the next verses to call us to put to death the parts of you that are earthly, indicating that we already share in the new life Jesus won for us, though not fully. John tells us that it was the first day of the week, when Jesus' tomb was discovered empty. The imagery here is of a new era, a new creation. As life began in the garden, where sin was first committed, so too death is destroyed and new life is revealed in the garden where Jesus was entombed. But even Jesus' disciples do not immediately grasp the meaning of the empty tomb. According to our evangelist, Mary Magdalene thinks, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb" and Peter remains unsure "for they did not yet understand the Scripture." Comprehending the truth of the Resurrection is beyond our grasp without God's enlightenment.

For reflection: How can I better live in the new life given to me by Christ's death and Resurrection? Does my belief in the Resurrection affect the way I live my life?

Símbolos de la Pascua de Resurrección

Blanco y Dorado en la Pascua. Blanco simboliza nueva vida, igual que inocencia, victoria, gozo, pureza e integridad a la vida de Fe. Dorado es el color de la luz y el esplendor de la Resurrección.

Cirio Pascual. Es inscrito con cinco granos de incienso en forma de cruz, representando las heridas de Jesús; el año y las letras Alfa y Omega, que representan la presencia de Cristo en Su Iglesia ahora y siempre. Es prendida por primera vez en el Fuego Pascual y llevada en procesión hasta la Iglesia, es encendida en todas las Misas hasta Pentecostés como símbolo del Cristo Resucitado. A través del año: en el Bautizo y el Funeral, para recordar que morimos y resucitamos con Cristo.

Agua. Que es la señal de Nueva Vida. En el Día de Pascua nos rocían con Agua Santa para recordar nuestro Bautizo y la renovación de nuestros votos bautismales.

Lirios de Pascua. Simbolizan esperanza, vida nueva, pureza, virtud e inocencia – la esencia espiritual de Pascua. Leyenda dice, que los lirios fueron encontrados creciendo en el Jardín de Getsemaní, después de la agonía de Cristo. La Iglesia tradicionalmente llena el altar de lirios en la Pascua, conmemorando la resurrección de Jesucristo y simbolizando nuestra esperanza de vida eterna.

Notas Espirituales:

La lectura de hoy de Hechos nos da un sentido de la primera forma de predicación en la comunidad apostólica. Las palabras de Pedro en la casa de Cornelio, un centurión romano y el primer gentil para abrazar el cristianismo, resumen el Kerigma cristiano: Jesús, el ungido de Dios, murió y resucitó de entre los muertos. Para Lucas, el autor de los Hechos, esto es un cumplimiento de las palabras de Dios pronunciadas por "todos los profetas."

Pablo nos dice a los Colosenses y a nosotros que al tener una participación en la vida de Cristo a través de nuestro bautismo, también tenemos una participación en su resurrección. "Cuando Cristo aparece en la gloria, tendremos una parte de esa gloria, compartiendo en nuestra muerte, Jesús nos da una participación en su resurrección, porque fuimos resucitados con Cristo. Para llamarnos también a morir las partes de ustedes que son terrenales, indicando que ya participamos en la nueva vida que Jesús ganó para nosotros, aunque no totalmente. Juan nos dice que fue el primer día de la semana, cuando la tumba de Jesús fue descubierto vacío. La imagen aquí es de una nueva era, una nueva creación. Como la vida comenzó en el jardín, donde el pecado fue cometido por primera vez, también la muerte se destruye y nueva vida se revela en el jardín donde Jesús fue sepultado. Pero incluso los discípulos de Jesús no comprenden inmediatamente el significado de la tumba vacía. Según nuestro evangelista, María Magdalena piensa: "Han sacado al Señor de la tumba" y Pedro permanece inseguro "porque aún no entendían la Escritura." Comprender la verdad de la resurrección está más allá de nuestro alcance sin la iluminación de Dios.

Para reflexionar: ¿Cómo puedo vivir mejor en la nueva vida que me da la muerte y la resurrección de Cristo? ¿Mi fe en la resurrección afecta la forma en que vivo mi vida?
