Spiritual Notes:

The Book of Wisdom, dated to the century before Christ, served as a text to enlighten and encourage the Jewish people in Jesus' day. Today's reading emphasizes God's mercy and supremacy. God, who is "master of might," judges "with clemency." We are called to learn from God's example of leniency that those who are just must be kind. Master over all, God is also lenient to all, giving us reason to hope that He would allow repentance. As the maker of all, God does not desire us to perish but to share in eternal life. Matthew presents us with another of Jesus' agricultural parables today, though the message is quite different from last week's. In the parable of the weeds among the wheat, we encounter the notion of God's judgment. In the Old Testament, the image of a harvest is employed as a metaphor for divine judgment; this imagery is familiar to Jesus' disciples. Although we might look to pull up the weeds sown among the wheat, God allows the good and the bad to exist side by side, "until harvest." This is a sign of God's mercy, for there is a possibility that the sinner will repent - the "weed" will become "wheat." God's patience anticipates the conversion of sinners. Paul writes that in our weakness we experience the assistance of the Spirit who intercedes for us. On our own, we are inadequate; "we do not know how to pray as we ought." Our salvation depends on God. This is why we are a people of hope, called to live lives of righteousness and to entrust ourselves to God's mercy.

For reflection: Have I experienced God's patience in my life? What does it teach me? What is my approach to the "weeds" I encounter in life: judgment or mercy?

Stand up and be counted!

Notas Espirituales:

El libro de la Sabiduría, fechada en el siglo antes de Cristo, sirvió como un texto para iluminar y animar al pueblo judío en los tiempos de Jesús. La lectura de hoy hace hincapié en la misericordia y la supremacía de Dios. Dios, que es "maestro de poder, los" jueces "con clemencia." Estamos llamados a aprender del ejemplo de la clemencia de Dios "aquellos que son justo debe ser bondadoso." Amo sobre todo, Dios también es "clemente para todos," que nos motiva y nos esperar a que nos arrepintamos. Como el creador de todo, Dios no desea que nos perdamos, sino que compartamos en la vida eterna.

Mateo nos presenta otra de las parábolas agrícolas de Jesús hoy en día, aunque el mensaje es bastante diferente de la semana pasada. En la parábola de la cizaña entre el trigo, nos encontramos con la idea del juicio de Dios. En el Antiguo Testamento, la imagen de una cosecha se emplea como una metáfora para el juicio divino; esta imagen es familiar a los discípulos de Jesús. Aunque podríamos mirar arrancar las malas hierbas por abajo entre el trigo, Dios permite que los buenos y los malos convivan, "hasta la cosecha." Este es un signo de la misericordia de Dios, porque existe la posibilidad de que el pecador se arrepienta que "la mala hierba" se convertirá en "trigo." La paciencia de Dios prevé la conversión de los pecadores.

Pablo escribe que en nuestra debilidad experimentamos la ayuda del Espíritu quien intercede por nosotros. Nosotros mismos somos insuficientes; "nosotros no sabemos cómo debemos pedir en la oración." Nuestra salvación depende de Dios. Es por ello que somos un pueblo de esperanza, llamados a vivir una vida de rectitud y confiarnos a la misericordia de Dios.

Para la reflexión: ¿He experimentado la paciencia de Dios en mi vida? ¿Qué me enseña? ¿Cuál es mi enfoque de las "malas hierbas" que encuentro en la vida: el juicio o la misericordia?
